REFLECTION:

After the miraculous catch of fish, Peter realised as never before his own sinfulness and the holiness of Christ. He asked Christ to depart from him. But Christ showed him that his sins and weaknesses would not prevent him from sharing in his work.

While our sinfulness humbles us, we should not let it get us down or make us feel that we do not belong in the company of Christ. Instead, Christ came to help us to overcome our sins. It was at the very moment that Peter recognised his sinfulness, that Christ challenged him to be a fisher of men. Peter knew that the only thing he could rely on was the word and the power of Christ.

We must not be put off by our weaknesses or make an excuse out of them for doing nothing. St Paul puts it like this: "So, I am not only content with my weaknesses, but I have actually learned to boast of them, for it is when I am weak that I am strong, because then the power of Christ is available in me." (2 Corinthians 12:9-10)

ABINGDON COMPASSIONATE CAFÉ

This fairly new venture was launched last September, and the next session is on Friday 21st March from 10am to 12 noon in the beautiful gardens of St Ethelwold's House. The café aims to provide a supportive gathering and a comforting space for conversation, along with cake, tea, coffee, or soft drinks, to talk openly, or one-to-one about grief, difficult diagnoses, or caring for a loved one nearing the end of life.

THE WAY OF A PILGRIM - A JUBILEE REFLECTION

At its core, the Jubilee is a chance for the global Church to renew its commitment to being a liferestoring force on a fractured, war-torn planet. The word 'Jubilee' derives from the Hebrew *jobel*, a ram's horn blown to proclaim a yearlong period in which farmers left fields to rest and recover. 1300 years after the first Catholic Jubilee year, the Holy Year remains a dedicated time and space where pilgrims can contemplate how to best care for life on Earth. In a world that centres productivity and individualism, the Jubilee gestures towards a more communal and sustainable way of living.

"Pilgrimage is a space where you reinforce this idea of coming together so that when you go back home, you really take something new with you," says Filomeno Lopez, a writer and theologian from Guinea Bissau. The act of pilgrimage, Mr Lopez says, is integral to instilling empathy for the migrant experience. In his view, Christ himself came to Earth as a migrant from the heavens, and the human experience itself is an amalgamation of temporary journeys and quests for salvation. Thus, we are all guests in the natural world, and it is up to us to honour its sanctity. "The nature of a human being is to be a pilgrim," he said. "Jubilee is a period to stop for a while and think about what is really needed in life. As a pilgrim, we are here for such a short period. Before I leave, what can I leave to others?"
